### **At EXPO 2016**

Our Wend/Sorb Society took part in the Australian history & genealogy EXPO in Adelaide on 7-8 October 2016. Arranged by the organisation, *Unlock the Past – Gould Genealogy*, it was the first national expo to be held in Australia. It was held in the Immanuel College sports centre.

Over 500 people attended on each day; some came from interstate. Around 100 different organisations had exhibits and there were expert speakers to listen to.

# President's AGM Report (given on 28 Aug 2016)

Our annual bus trip was a special one this year, as it was the final one that Eric and Ruth Fiebig organised. We visited some lesser-known places like Concordia (near Gawler), the Habermann family cemetery at Bethany, Graetz Town (near Keyneton) and got close to Towitta, the site of the Schippan murder mystery. The Murder Mystery Tour was enjoyed by all, and we thank Eric and Ruth for their thorough organising of our tours over the last 8 years.

Bus trips have been a special feature of our Wend Society program for many years and have been extremely popular. Can we continue to provide them? At our June meeting I gave an illustrated talk on the trip that my wife Lois and I made to both Upper and Lower Lusatia last year. Our pictures showed numerous villages, churches, museums, harvest festivals and a punt trip along the canals of the Spreewald.

At Bautzen we visited the Sorb Institute and met Gertrud Mahling (Trudla Malinkowa), the author of the book, *Shores of Hope*. We encouraged her to visit Australia and we assured her that many people would be interested to meet her and show her around the Wendish sites here. We also gave the Sorb Institute a number of books about Wends and Germans in Australia for their library. Also at Bautzen we collected a number of DVDs from Toni Bruk at the Sorabia Film Studio for showing in Australia.

At a harvest festival we were excited to see a dancing group from a village near Hoyerswerda in Middle Lusatia. The women were wearing the same dancing costume that our society owns. As well they displayed the wedding costume which we also have. These costumes were featured in our March newsletter this year.

On Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> July a number of our members came together for a luncheon at the German Club. If the volume of the conversation is any measure, it was thoroughly enjoyed by all. In fact, one member asked if these social gatherings could be organised 4 times a year. What do you think? [Ed. See page 6]

We are looking forward to taking part in the first Australian History & Genealogy Expo on 7-8 October at Immanuel College this year. The organisers have been overwhelmed by the large amount of interest shown by societies like ours and by family historians (genealogists) from all over Australia. ### **Peters Hill Cremonument dedicated**

On Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> November 2016 the Friends of Peters Hill Church Inc. held their Annual Church Service, shared lunch and Annual General Meeting.

After the 11 am service Pastor Leon Rosenberg led the congregation to the adjoining cemetery and officially dedicated the recently completed Cremonument, which is a monument with spaces for placing cremation urns.

This project, the latest by the Friends of Peters Hill Church Committee of Management, had been in the planning stage for some time. Norm and Ruth Schmidtke spent considerable hours touring cemeteries for ideas on designs.

Norm finally put pen to paper and came up with a plan which incorporated the Wendish Star and Circle. This motif had been adopted by the early Wendish settlers, often being painted on the church ceiling or suspended from it. The Peters Hill Church built in 1864 incorporated this motif in the window vents.

The star represents Divine Guidance and the circle The Everlasting Light.

Pearse Monumental Masons of Clare constructed and erected the Cremonument made of black and grey polished granite with placement for 16 interments.

## Australian Wends in the Great War





As Australia commemorates the sacrifices made during World War I, our Wend/Sorb Society is interested in identifying those Australians of Wendish descent who fought and/or died for this country. When the Wendish ancestry comes from the mother, we record her maiden name. Unless otherwise stated they served on the Western Front.

We continue (from the last two newsletters) the record of the Wends who served:

DUSCHKE, Louis Otto, from Gidginbung, NSW (formerly from Horsham district, V); 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion; Killed in action, 23 August 1918, aged 23, buried Heath Cemetery, Harbonnieres, France.

DUSCHKE, William Arthur Oliver, from Moutajup, V; 6<sup>th</sup> Battalion; Died of pneumonia 15 Feb 1919, aged 19, buried Charleroi Communal Cemetery, France.

SCHIMENTZ, Frederick William, (grandmother's maiden name was DREKO (DRECKOW)), from Lyndoch SA; 50<sup>th</sup> Battalion; Died of wounds 8 June 1917, aged 18 (or 23), buried Trois Arbres Cemetery, Steenwerck, France.

## Modra wins bronze

Kieran Modra won his 10<sup>th</sup> Paralympic medal at the Rio Paralympic Games last September.

As a vision-impaired athlete he has competed at eight Paralympic Games since 1988, and has won an amazing five gold and five bronze medals. He also won two silver medals at the 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games.

At Rio he won bronze in the Men's Road Time Trial B, riding tandem with his sighted pilot David Edwards. They averaged 50 kph over 30 km to clinch the bronze medal.

Kieran is the son of our members, Theo and Sylvia Modra of Port Lincoln.

Kieran first won bronze in swimming in 1992, but he then switched to cycling, where he has dominated ever since. Now aged 44 years he is uncertain whether he will contest another Paralympic Games. Congratulations to our champion!

# My visit to Lusatia

In September-October 2016 my wife Lois and I took a trip to Europe and spent one week in Upper and Lower Lusatia.

In Bautzen we visited the Sorb Museum (Serbski Muzej) with its wonderful collection of items about Sorb (Wendish) history, culture and way of life. An English audio guide was useful in understanding everything on display. A large collection of models illustrated the different costumes worn in the different regions.

At the Sorbisches Restaurant Wjelbik we tasted a delicious meal of Sorb dishes.

On our visit to the Sorb Institute we met Gertud Mahling (Trudla Malinkowa), the author of the book *Shores of Hope* about Wendish migration to Australia and America. She explained her project of recording Sorb monuments and Wendish matters. We invited her to come to Australia one day to see what happened to the Wendish migrants here. We also presented their library with some books about the Barossa Valley and Australia.

A contrasting museum was the infamous prison used in turn by the Nazis, the Russians, and finally the Stasi. There were many harrowing stories told.

The nearby village of Hochkirch was interesting as many Australian Wends came from this district. Here we met Pastor Thomas Hänchen who had visited Australia in 2003 and given a talk to our society. This was also the site of a terrible battle in 1758 when 8000 Austrians and 9000 Prussians were killed.

Close by was the town of Herrnhut, the centre of the Moravian Brethren Church. The light and simple interior of their church contrasted dramatically with the elaborate decorations in most other churches throughout Europe. The Völkerkundemuseum (ethnographic museum) was a highlight of the town with exhibits from around the world, sent home by Moravian missionaries in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, including some Aboriginal items from Australia.

To the west of Bautzen we visited Rosenthal, the hometown of the late Alfons Frenzel. This Catholic area was noticeable for the many shrines along the country roads.

We travelled north to Lower Lusatia and stayed near Burg in the Spreewald. Here the River Spree divides into numerous canals which pass through forest areas. Taking a punt (*Kahn*) trip along the canals, being poled along by the ferryman is a special experience. The ride is gentle and relaxing along shady streams, through locks, meeting other punts and canoes.



At Jänschwalde we visited the Heimatmuseum and were excited to see a school register from the 19<sup>th</sup> century with names of people who came to Australia, including my Hondow ancestors.

At Langengrassau we went to the Freiland Museum Höllberghof, an open-air museum, which was celebrating the harvest festival. It was here that a Sorbian dancing group performed, with the women wearing the same dress as we have in our society's collection. Then they exhibited their wedding dress, which again was identical to the one in our collection (see March 2016 newsletter).

On the Sunday morning we attended the harvest thanksgiving service in the church at Burg. Here we met a lady in traditional costume, who was keen to tell us that in this district they call themselves Wends, not Sorbs.

These are some of the highlights of our visit. I can't wait to go there again.
